





Countries marked in red were represented in 2022, those marked in green were countries previously

WCWW9 Summary

The total number of countries that have taken part at least once is now 87. That number was reached this year with two new nations joining the event, Cuba and Libya. Both the Neotropics and Africa are well served for this event by our friends Wader Quest South Africa (Peter and Jenny Sharland & Sue and Owen Oertli) and Wader Quest Brasil (led by Bruno Lima and Karina Ávila), reaching out, not just in their own country and region. but to people across the continent and even beyond.

In Libya there was just one team of two, but in Cuba the event really took off with a total of 14 observers from various parts of the island, and we welcome both to the event with great pleasure.

In addition we welcomed back Tanzania, which was last involved in 2018, and we had encouraging returns from debutants last year; El Salvador, Germany, Guatemala, Palau, Pakistan and Trinidad & Tobago, hopefully they will all become regulars from now on.

Also worth a mention is the contribution from Belarus. Since the Russian invasion of Ukraine (which understandably is not included this year, although it has been in the past) naturalists and scientists have been under pressure from the pro-Russian government as they tend to wander around the countryside with optical equipment, raising suspicions that they are spies. A number have been arrested and other deterred from their work. This then makes the participation of those in Belarus not only big hearted but brave as well; it is clear what wader conservation means to them, if they are willing to risk their safety to show that they have not forgotten the birds, despite the situation they find themselves in.

Another pleasing aspect of this year was the increase in the number of photos we received, not just of birds but of participants too, we are truly grateful for all of these and have included many, indeed most, of them to make the newsletter more visually attractive.

We are still keen to recruit people who may be able to help from other regions. There is no doubt that exhortations to join an event are much more effective if they come from someone in the region among people who they already know, rather than some random organisation, with which they have no connection, from some other part of the world. If you have a good network of birders and observers at your finger tips, or are involved in an organisation that does, then perhaps we could encourage you to take up the cause and see how many people you can get to join us next year.

Pleasingly, thus far, each year we get new species recorded. This year there were two; Rock Sandpiper and Painted Buttonquail. The first was reported from Alaska, the first time that state has been involved with a report from Joey Hausler, who saw a magnificent 200 of them together. The Rock Sandpiper breeds around the Aleutian Islands and into Alaska but they do not travel far south even in winter, only reaching as far as Washington or Oregon down the Pacific coast. Very often people living in the higher latitudes feel there is no point to joining the event as they have few species to offer. But this report shows why we are keen to get lists, even if they comprise just one species, as in this case, or even none at all, from the far north.

Buttonquails are often hard to find and the report of the Painted Buttonquail came to us via one of our contributors in Australia, Julie Keating, who was this year deservedly awarded the Sutherland Shire Environmental Citizen of the Year and goes by the name of Shire Jewels on social media, spotted that Shaye Byles had photographed a Painted Buttonquail. She reached out to him and informed him of the event and he readily allowed the record to be included. We definitely encourage others to do the same if they know, or hear of, other birders who may be interested in contributing, but are unaware of the event, to get in touch with them and recruit them on our behalf.

First and last again!



But those of us who do not live there always assume that California is forever sunny and warm. Of course this is not true, but it was nevertheless a surprise to hear from regular contributor and friend Becky Bowen that her birding was severely interrupted by fog. Despite this setback, she valiantly set forth and still managed to find a couple of crucial species for us; Surfbird and Black Turnstone, just going to emphasise that it is the taking part that counts (but the added species don't hurt admittedly).

And in Florida...

Fog was not an issue in Florida, it is caused by still weather with not a breath of wind among other factors, and not long prior to WCWW hurricane Ian passed through the state. Meg Rousher, another of our stalwart contributors went out to survey the damage and reported that she was very relieved to see that the shorebirds had somehow survived the maelstrom. Happ though as that made her feel, she was very sad to see the damage that had been wrought by the storm with the 'beautiful beaches destroyed and the mangroves littered with debris'. She concluded that with the evidence of the destruction all around her, seeing the shorebirds made her realise, despite their apparently fragile and diminutive appearance; 'Shorebirds are tough!'.

Snippets

When is a snipe not a snipe?

When it is impossible to assign it to species in the field, that's when. It takes some courage, if you are listing, to leave species as an either/or, but it is very frustrating. When the observer is someone with the experience and expertise of Chris Hassell of the Global Flyway Network, then it just goes to show how difficult some 'sister- species' can be.

When he sent in his list it had Pin-tailed/ Swinhoe's Snipe on it. Swinhoe's Snipe is a species we have yet to record, so this is particularly unfortunate.

A few years ago we had a hybrid Black/Whiteheaded Stilt recorded, in that case we cheekily counted it as a half; it was tempting to do so again this time for the snipe, but couldn't justify it, even tongue in cheek.

Getting hot under the Collared Pratincole.

Southern Africa is a regular wintering ground for Collared Pratincoles, this photo was taken in Botswana. However, it is not universally common there with a distinct bias towards the east of the region. In the Northern Cape they are rare and this year, when one was found during WCWW it was thought to be a first for the province. However, a bit of investigation by our friends in South Africa revealed that it is the first officially recorded for the Southern African Bird Atlas Project (SABAP) and in any case it is the first for 17 years, making it still a very remarkable record. There had been two records of the species between SABAP1 and SABAP2; one near the Namibian border (late 1990s) and one at Spitskop Dam in 2005.

This photo was sent to us taken in South Africa of a Turnstone upending African Elephant poo.








